

# Pregnancy and beyond Information Sheet A Guide from College Road Surgery

This explains what to expect from your GP Practice Team and local NHS services throughout your pregnancy and birth up to your child's 11th birthday. It includes contact details for local services, support groups and advice.

What should I do if I think I am pregnant?	Do a pregnancy test	Pregnancy Testing Kits available to purchase from pharmacies and supermarkets.	Most pregnancy kits will provide an accurate result from the first day of your missed period.  There is no need to have a positive result confirmed by a GP.
Once you know you are pregnant you should:	Book your first midwife appointment (Antenatal Booking Appointment).	Self refer to Ashford and St Peter's (ASPH) maternity unit.  https://www.asphmaternity.co.uk/maternity-self-referral-form/	Booking Appointment should ideally happen between 7 - 9 weeks.  The appointment lasts about 80 minutes. You will be given health, nutrition, maternity benefits advice and details about antenatal screening tests etc

#### **Postnatal Care**

Shortly before, or just after the birth	You will receive a Personal Child Heath Record (PCHR), often called the "red book" to record your baby's weight, height, vaccinations etc	Bring this book to all appointments You can add information to this book eg. Child illnesses, accidents, medicines etc
10 - 14 days after birth	<ul> <li>Your care will transfer from the midwife to a health visitor.</li> <li>A visit by health visitor to your home will be arranged by phone</li> </ul>
