All blister packs, whether previously used to hold medications or vitamins, and no matter which brand, can be recycled through the scheme.



*Boots Advantage Card members can now earn 100 points (worth £1) for every five empty blister packs when they drop them off at a participating Boots store and spend £5 or more.



NHS issue RSV vaccination reminder to Surrey public

The NHS in Surrey is encouraging all those invited to have their Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) vaccine to take up the offer and get protected against the virus.

Of the 46,000 people living in Surrey who meet the eligibility criteria, just over half have received their vaccination (58%)*.

RSV is a common cause of coughs and colds and serious for some babies and older adults
